Matthew 4:12-23 - "I will make you fish for people" or "I will make you fishers of men"

In Matthews account of the call of the first disciples, Simon, Peter, Andrew, James and John we don't really learn anything about these four men except that they are fishermen by trade. The social background of these four men is not important. All we see is four men being taken away from their personal and professional lives in response to the call of Jesus upon them.

And what are they called to? Jesus uses a really odd symbol here! "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men". We are so used to this phrase, we don't even think of it as a bit off, but actually, I think it is...

What happens to a fish when it is caught? It dies! Does our fishing for people result in their spiritual death? Is the church full of spiritually dead people? Also, a fish doesn't want to be caught and is pulled on board the boat unwillingly. So are we to force people into church and force them into a relationship with God through which they will only encounter spiritual death?

These first disciples would probably have heard of Jesus; he was after all, walking round Galilee proclaiming the kingdom of God and as Galilean fishermen, they would probably have been aware of him.

So what would have been going through their heads when they decided to leave all behind and follow this new, major teacher who had come back to Galilee from out of the wilderness?

Simon, Peter, Andrew, James and John were called by Jesus to fish for people and the uncertainty of that phrase led them to basically misunderstand their call and that resulted in the spiritual struggles that they had to work through over the coming years.

We might think that becoming Christian or coming to church will result in one way of living, but when we truly give our lives over to Jesus, things often take a different turn altogether.

Jesus said "Follow me, and I will help you fish for people". The church throughout history has taken this as a call to mission and evangelism - and so it is. But originally it is the personal challenge that all of us face when we become Christians that Jesus will take us in a direction that we least expect.

This part of Matthews Gospel should leave us feeling a little uncomfortable about what it means to be a Christian. We are not called to an easy life, we have illnesses that some recover from or are still ongoing, we are not called to power and authority - but to a tough life that will constantly surprise us and challenge us. We all have challenges in our lives. I've had 2 massive challenges... breast cancer and heart failure. And so we are called to constantly weigh up why we are followers of Christ and what it is that we want to get out of this lifestyle we have chosen.

And so my friends think about this:- are we seeking honour and glory and power and authority and respect? Or are we prepared to walk the way of the cross and all that this will mean for us in our everyday lives?

Stay safe and have an enjoyable but safe week.

KOBE BRYANT IN NEWSWEEK: 'WE NEVER KNOW WHEN OUR TIME HERE WILL BE OVER'

Kobe Bean Bryant (August 23, 1978 – January 26, 2020) was an American professional basketball player who played his entire 20-season career in the National Basketball Association (NBA) with the Los Angeles Lakers. He entered the NBA directly from high school and won five NBA championships. Bryant was an 18-time All-Star, 15-time member of the All-NBA Team, 12-time member of the All-Defensive Team, and the 2008 NBA Most Valuable Player (MVP). Widely regarded as one of the greatest basketball players of all time, he led the NBA in scoring during two seasons, ranks fourth on the league's all-time regular season scoring, and ranks fourth on the all-time postseason scoring list. Bryant was the first guard in NBA history to play at least 20 seasons. At 34 years and 104 days of age, Bryant became the youngest player in league history to reach 30,000 career points. He became the all-time leading scorer in Lakers franchise history on February 1, 2010, when he

surpassed Jerry West. During his third year in the league, Bryant was chosen to start the All-Star Game, and was selected to start that game for a record 18 consecutive appearances until his retirement. His four All-Star MVP Awards are tied with Bob Pettit for the most in NBA history. At the 2008 and 2012 Summer Olympics, he won two gold medals as a member of the U.S. national team. In 2018, he won the Academy Award for Best Animated Short Film for his film Dear Basketball.

In 2001 Kobi Bryant wrote the following essay on the significance of the "911" tragedy:

One of the things I always believed is that no matter how bad something is, you can take something positive out of it. The one time I wasn't sure of that was on September 11.

I usually wake up at 6:30 or 7 in the morning. That day, I happened to wake up earlier. I turned on the television and as I was flipping through channels, I saw that a plane had crashed into the North Tower of the World Trade Center. My initial reaction was that it was a terrible accident. Then I saw another plane fly into the South Tower and I realized that I was witnessing an act of terrorism.

I woke up my wife, Vanessa. As we sat and viewed the tragic events, we grieved for the victims and their families; we prayed for the survivors; we watched with disbelief as our great country was attacked. We both knew things would never be the sameour country and our lives would be changed forever.

I had a commercial shoot that day. I called it off. Like the rest of America, my wife and I spent the day glued to the television, watching the horrific images over and over again. My heart ached as I watched family members searching the streets for their loved ones. The pain and fear in their eyes is something I will never forget. I sat on my couch overwhelmed with emotion. I was sad and angry and even a little bit confused. I could not understand how something this horrible could have happened. I wanted answers and explanations. Who was responsible for taking the lives of so many innocent people? What was their motivation? How could our leaders have let this happen?

As the day went on, my mind was flooded with so many thoughts. I kept thinking about the people on those planes and in those buildings, and about

how their families had no idea that such horrible things were happening to them. There was no one to help the victims. They had nowhere to turn. I wanted so badly to be able to do something; the feeling of powerlessness was terrible.

I thought about all of the firefighters going into the burning buildings to rescue people and never coming out. It reminded me of my grandfather, who was a Philadelphia firefighter and captain of a firehouse. Growing up, I heard my grandfather tell stories about numerous rescues where he and his comrades put their lives on the line to save people they had never even met. As a child, I did not understand his job or why doing something that risked his life could bring him so much joy. Now I realize his happiness was derived from his devotion to helping people.

A lot of people say that athletes are heroes, but I know that's not really true. The real heroes are firefighters and police officers, the men and women willing to risk their lives to save others. I really like the new NBA public-service spots which show footage of those policemen and firefighters, and NBA stars such as Ray Allen of the Milwaukee Bucks saying, "We know who the real heroes are."

I hear older and wiser people talk about the attack on Pearl Harbour and the Kennedy assassination and how drastically those events affected them. For my generation, the tragedy of September 11 paralleled that of Pearl Harbour. We will be talking about the devastating effect this day had on our country, and our lives as individuals, for years to come.

It wasn't until a few weeks after September 11 that I began to see that perhaps some good did come from this tragedy. People seem different now, more understanding, more tolerant. We seem to have our priorities more in order and we're able to put things in perspective in a more constructive way. Little things that seemed to be such a bother before are no longer a big deal.

Personally, I am more patient than I was. I realize life is too short, and too precious, to let myself get upset over trivial things. Life is also too short to carry grudges and therefore I've become more forgiving and understanding. I've learned also that you can't take things for granted. You know how we always say, "See you later"? One thing I've realized from September 11 is that

you can't ever say that for sure. Things change in the blink of an eye. People go to work and don't come back. One minute they're living and the next minute they're not. And, it doesn't matter who you are, there is nothing you can do about it. Bill Cosby's son was killed. Michael Jordan's father was killed. We never know when our time here will be over, so we all need to make the most of every minute we have.

You try to learn from what happened. You can't be consumed by it. You can't live by it. All you can do is just live.

Please see an article below from two FCO Ministers - Lord Ahmad of Wimbledon (Minister for the Commonwealth, the UN and South Asia) and Christopher Pincher MP (Minister for Europe and the Americas).

"As the United Kingdom Government's Ministers of State responsible for our Overseas Territories (OTs), a priority for us, and for the entire Government, has been to work closely with Territory leaders to identify the opportunities and concerns in each OT associated with Brexit.

You will be aware of the recent General Election in the United Kingdom, the resulting new dynamics in the United Kingdom's Parliament and the decisive action of the Prime Minister to press ahead with Brexit. The United Kingdom is set to leave the EU on 31 January with a deal – the Prime Minister's newly negotiated Withdrawal Agreement. The Withdrawal Agreement provides for an implementation period lasting until 31 December 2020, a time-limited period of transition before Brexit-related changes take place. We want to take this opportunity to set out what this means for people and businesses in the OTs.

To summarise – during the implementation period, your rights and those of your family members <u>will not change</u>, and neither will the relationship OT companies and NGOs have with the EU.

Many of you may be thinking about how Brexit could affect your ability to travel or live abroad. Firstly, we would like to make clear that eligibility criteria for British passports of all types will not be affected by our departure from the EU. Secondly, the rules on travelling to the EU will remain the same throughout the implementation period. This means British Citizen passport holders will be able to continue to live, work and study in the EU as they do now. The rights of British Overseas Territory Citizen (BOTC) passport holders – including 90-day visa-free access to the Schengen area in any 180 days – will also not change, either during the implementation period or afterwards.

We fully understand the importance of EU funding for a number of organisations in the Territories. That is why the United Kingdom Government had agreed to cover EU-funded projects in the OTs under EDF, BEST, Horizon 2020 and Erasmus+ if the EU were to cease payments. As part of the Prime Minister's deal, there is no longer any risk of this: projects in the OTs under these funding streams will continue to be covered by the EU for their duration.

Businesses in the OTs exporting goods to the EU27 will continue to be able to export tariff and quota-free for the duration of the implementation period. Tariff and quota-free access to the United Kingdom market for OT goods will continue indefinitely. While post-2020 access to the EU27 market is a matter for the upcoming negotiations on the Future Partnership, the United Kingdom Government is absolutely committed to seeking the best possible access for OT goods as part of our future relationship with the EU. During these negotiations the United Kingdom Government will also work to ensure that any post-2020 mobility arrangements agreed with the EU consider the specific needs and requirements of the OTs.

We want to both assure you and to leave you in no doubt that the United Kingdom is absolutely committed to the safety and prosperity of each of our British OTs. Brexit is no exception to this. As we head into the next phase of the negotiations and take up the opportunities afforded by our departure from the EU, including the ability to negotiate our own trade agreements around the world, the continuing priority for the United Kingdom Government is to ensure that the voices of our OTs are heard. And that your priorities inform our approach to the negotiations every step of the way."

From The Archives

Our series of extracts from Mrs Gill's book Six Months on Ascension continues with a description of the reasons for a fight. The book is an account of her time with her husband's 1877 expedition to observe the Transit of Mars, from where Mars Bay gets its name.

On one occasion this fishing mania gave opportunity for a cruel practical joke at my expense. I had just spent a Sunday in Garrison; and when I returned on Monday, hot and hungry from the clinker, a dish of delicious filleted fish was set before me. This I concluded to be rock-cod, to which my exceeding hunger was giving all unusual relish. More than once I expressed my appreciation of this dainty dish, testifying to it still more strongly by making an excellent meal. David kept on saying how glad he was that I liked the fish, and then, as if a sudden thought had struck him, he turned to Hill and asked, "What sort of fish is it?"

"Conger eel, sir!" said Hill, in a tone of suppressed amusement.

"Eels!" I exclaimed in disgust; and threw down the fork which was conveying a choice morsel to my lips.

I had all the prejudice of a Scotchwoman against the nasty things, and nothing would induce me to have them at my table, so my ingenious husband had recourse to this cruel experiment, hoping thereby to cure me of my fancy. But who would give up a pet prejudice or a pet superstition without a struggle in this age of logic and hard facts? I was not going to yield to the first assault, so I at once declared that I felt sick and altogether much too ill to watch for Mars that night.

"Revenge is sweet, especially to women."

Besides this horrid conger—which, strange to say, is considered quite a delicacy in Ascension—out little bay swarmed with fish of every shape and size, from the monster shark, that cost us much in the way of lost lilies and hooks, to a lovely nimble wee fish, vulgarly called

"five fingers", striped with changeful greens, and glistening like a rainbow with every restless motion. The white-fleshed cavalhoe and the savoury rock-cod were the staple food of our breakfast and dinner table; but, numerous as they were, it required no small skill to catch them, owing to the larger number and greater greed of the hideous black "old maids", with their double row of dog-like teeth. If the rock-cod did not look sharp, these ravenous creatures got hooked in their stead, much to our disgust, for they were unfit for table use.

Beautiful opal-coloured mackerel darted about in the clear pools, and it became quite a sort with David to spear them, for bait, with his iron-pointed alpen-stock. Prickly sea-urchins lay curled up like balls of miniature bayonets among the coral, and the lovely sea anemones bloomed fair in our marine garden at Mars Bay. Numbers of little crabs crawled everywhere above and about the rocks, where myriads of "natives" lived and died; and from under many a weed-grown stone a slimy cuttle-fish would stretch out a hideous arm for a passing crab.

These salt pools, left by the receding waves among the rocks, were beautiful natural aquariums, in whose inhabitants we had great interest; and our daily sunset walk invariably took the shape of a scramble along the beach in search of "fairlies".

Sometimes, instead of pools we found little islands of white salt lying among the black rocks, testifying to the rapid evaporation, due in great measure to the constant trade-wind. We did enjoy these scrambles, when, after the heat of the day, our parched lungs were refreshed with a draught of fresh cool air; and, if too great curiosity regarding some sea-creature cost us a wetting, that but added to the pleasing excitement of the excursion.

The museum is open every Saturday from 10:00 to 12:00. We have an extensive stock of books, t-shirts and many other mementoes of the island.

Help and support with criminal and civil matters

What is a Lay Advocate?

A Lay Advocate can provide you with **impartial, independent** and **confidential support** and **guidance.** The Lay Advocates on Ascension receive regular development training including update training on real cases which occur both here and on St Helena. They are also in regular and direct contact with the Public Solicitor's Office on St Helena and the Consultant Public Solicitor.

The Lay Advocates can be contacted at any time and, as practicable, are available 24 hours a day. At any time, you can request to have a Lay Advocate present and at any time you can elect to have a different Advocate without question.

Criminal Matters

If you have attended, or are intending to attend a police station voluntarily or if you have been charged, detained, arrested by the Police or are due to appear in Court, the Lay Advocate can support your through these processes and importantly ensure that Police procedures are followed explicitly according to Police and Criminal Evidence Ordinance (PACE).

Should an arrest result in a court appearance, the Advocate will guide you through the stages of the court process prior to your hearing and attend with you on the day to present your defence on your behalf if you wish.

If you attend the police station voluntarily or are arrested or detained by the Police, the Police <u>must</u> ask you if you would like a Lay Advocate to be present. The choice of Advocate is entirely yours but if your first choice is unavailable you will be asked if you would like a second choice. You do not have to have a Lay Advocate present but it is strongly recommended.

Civil Matters

A Lay Advocate can also help with civil matters such as:

preparing a Will divorce petition including financial information name changes help with preparing guardianship and parental responsibility documentation immigration employment issues


